Seatbelts

Blind spots

Speed limits

Yield the right of way



Seatbelts



- All drivers and passengers must wear a seatbelt
 - Properly adjusted
 - Securely fastened
- Children in appropriate child/booster seat
- Wear seatbelt across chest and lower hips
- Ensure seatbelt is not twisted



Blind Spots

Check mirrors and blind spots often



Adjust mirrors to reduce blind spots

- Shoulder check before:
 - Changing lanes
 - Passing a vehicle
 - Turning right or left
 - Opening your door when street parking



Speed Limits



- Stay within maximum speed limit posted
- Adjust speed depending on road conditions, weather, traffic, school/construction zones
- If no signs, 50 km/hr in cities and built-up areas, 80 km/hr in other areas
- Follow at a safe distance → two second gap



Yield the right of way

Intersection with stop signs (4 corners)



Intersection turning left or right



Entering road from private road/driveway

Safe Driving - Do's

- ✓ Wear your seatbelt
- ✓ Follow the rules of the road
- Obey speed limits and road signs
- Pay attention while driving
- Be courteous to other drivers
- Watch for pedestrians and bicycles
- ✓ Keep an emergency kit in the vehicle
- ✓ Inspect the vehicle before use
- Perform preventative maintenance regularly



Safe Driving - Don'ts

- Consume alcohol or cannabis and drive
- Make assumptions about other drivers' actions
- Tailgate
- Purposely break rules of the road
- Play music at disruptive levels
- Use your cell phone while driving
- Engage in other activities while driving
- Participate in road rage



Winter Driving Tips

- Check your vehicle
- * Plan ahead, use good judgement
- Be prepared
- Slow down, stay alert and in control
- Share the road and watch for snowplows
- Obey road closures

Preparing an emergency kit for your vehicle



Prepare an Emergency Car Kit

Always have winter safety and emergency equipment in your car

- ✓ Water
- ☑ Blanket
- ☑ Clothing, shoes/boots
- ✓ First aid kit
- ✓ Seatbelt cutter

- ✓ Small shovel and snowbrush
- Candle and matches
- ✓ Wind-up flashlight
- ☑ Whistle
- Roadmaps
- ☑ Emergency plan



Items to Keep in Your Trunk

- ☑ Sand, salt or cat litter (non-clumping)
- Antifreeze and windshield washer fluid
- ✓ Tow rope
- ✓ Jumper cables
- ☑ Fire extinguisher
- ✓ Warning light or road flares



Get Prepared



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Pre-Trip Inspection

Inspecting your vehicle to ensure it can be operated safely



Daily Inspection

- ✓ Vehicle inspected before driving
- ☑ Complete inspection checklist
- ☑ Retain the completed checklist in the vehicle
- Records any defects found during/at end of trip
- ☑ Defects repaired immediately/before vehicle driven again



Ready, check, go!



Battery – check the terminals for cracks, corrosion or damage



Engine oil – check the oil level and top up if low



Transmission fluid – check the fluid level and look for red or pink colour. If it is brown, change it.



Ready, check, go!



Antifreeze – check the coolant in the overflow tank



Air filter – check your owners manual to determine how to replace the air filter



Tires – check to ensure inflation to recommended levels and check tread

Scenarios

A severe snow storm is expected in the middle of the night

- Consider rescheduling the following days' service appointments to avoid driving in unsafe conditions
 - Notify customers ahead of time that service may be cancelled due to inclement weather
- If appointments must be kept, drive slowly and with caution
- Stock your emergency kit, replace expired items



Another driver is tailgating you and driving aggressively

- Stay calm and don't get frustrated or angry
- Move over and let them pass
- Pull off the road (into a parking lot if possible) to diffuse the situation
- Don't respond with aggressive driving
- Call the police if you feel unsafe



You're involved in an accident

- Stop your vehicle, stay calm and call police
- If you are injured, wait for assistance
- If safe to do so, get out of the car and take pictures of the damage and accident scene
- Move the vehicle off the road if it can be driven
- Record information from involved drivers
- Contact your employer for next steps with insurance



Your pre-trip vehicle inspection reveals a flat tire

- If you feel comfortable doing so, change the flat tire using the spare tire
- Contact your employer's roadside assistance service of choice if you require assistance
- Arrange for the damaged tire to be repaired/replaced as soon as possible
- Drive with caution while utilizing the spare tire

SAFE DRIVING AWARENESS

Facilitator Guide



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Target Audience

This training has been designed for organizations in the service industry with 100 to 250+ employees. Many of these organizations are providing door-to-door delivery services (e.g. food deliveries) or provide onsite service to their respective customer base (e.g. computer and printer support service).

Motor vehicle incidents (MVIs) are one of the top four hazards for these service industry firms. Employees drive their own vehicles or have an allocated company vehicle. All employees are required to follow company driver policies and procedures.

Driver safety training is provided during onboarding, with yearly refresher training thereafter. Customers are looking to reduce the incidence of MVIs. This 30-minute course is intended to provide employees with ownership of their safe driving practices and generalized information regarding safe driving best practices. Where possible, refer employees to their individual company driving policies and procedures for more detailed information applicable to their role.

Safe Driving Best Practices (3 mins)

Seatbelts



- Blind spots
- Speed limits
- Yield the right of way

Seatbelts

- All drivers and passengers must wear a seatbelt that is:
 - o Properly adjusted
 - Securely fastened
- Children who are not old enough or big enough to wear a seatbelt must be in an appropriate child seat or booster seat.
- Wear seatbelt across chest and lower hips as these areas are better able to resist the force of a crash.
- Ensure seatbelt is not twisted. A twisted seatbelt won't spread the force of a crash across the body to protect properly in the event of a crash.

Blind Spots

- Check mirrors and blind spots often while driving and particularly before changing lanes
- Adjust mirrors to reduce blind spots as much as possible
- Shoulder check before:
 - o Changing lanes
 - o Passing a vehicle
 - o Turning right or left
 - o Opening your door when street parking
- Stay out of other drivers' blind spots

Speed Limits

- Stay within maximum speed limit posted on signs along all roads
- Adjust speed depending on road conditions, weather, traffic, school/construction zones
- If there are no posted speed limit signs, drive 50 km/hr in cities and built-up areas, and 80 km/hr in other areas
- Follow at a safe distance → leave a two second gap between the vehicle in front and avoid tailgating

Yield the right of way

There are times when you must yield the right-of-way. This means you must let another driver go first. Here are some rules about when you must yield the right-of-way.

At an intersection without signs or lights, you must yield the right-of-way to a vehicle approaching the intersection before you, and if you arrive at the same time, the vehicle approaching from the right has the right-of-way.



At an intersection with stop signs at all corners, you must yield the right-of-way to the first vehicle to come to a complete stop. If two vehicles stop at the same time, the vehicle on the left must yield to the vehicle on the right.

At any intersection where you want to turn left or right, you must yield the right-of-way. If you are turning left, you must wait for approaching traffic to pass or turn and for pedestrians in or approaching your path to cross. If you are turning right, you must wait for pedestrians to cross if they are in or approaching your path (Diagram 2-20). You should also check your blind spot for cyclists approaching from behind, particularly in a bike lane to your right, on a sidewalk or a trail. A yield sign means you must slow down or stop if necessary and yield the right-of-way to traffic in the intersection or on the intersecting road.

When entering a road from a private road or driveway, you must yield to vehicles on the road and pedestrians on the sidewalk.

When at a market pedestrian crossing, you must yield the right-of-way and wait for pedestrians to completely cross the road at pedestrian crossovers and school crossings with crossing guards.

Winter Driving Tips (1 min)

Check your vehicle - Get your vehicle winter-ready with a maintenance check-up. Carry an ice scraper and washer fluid effective to -40°C. Keep your fuel tank at least half full. Consider installing four winter tires.

Plan ahead, use good judgment - Plan your trip, locate your stops and check the weather. Check road conditions and closures online. Use your judgment too – delaying your trip may be the best option.



Be prepared - Have emergency supplies with you, including a charged cell phone. More on this later in the course.

Slow down, stay alert and in control - Many winter collisions occur because drivers are going too fast for road conditions. Slow down and allow extra space between you and other vehicles.

Share the road and watch for snowplows - Avoid crowding into the lane of on-coming traffic. Drive slowly near working snowplows and don't pass them.

Obey road closures - Do not drive on closed roads – it's against the law. Always obey emergency closure signs and follow the directions of police officers.
